COVID-19 VACCINATION UPDATE

Vaccination Roll Out

Alabama is now in the early stages of distributing vaccines to certain essential workers. As part of Austal's continuing effort to ensure your health and safety, Austal is coordinating with Mobile County Health Department to facilitate the administration of both doses of the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine. The vaccine will be free and available during work hours.

In an effort to better serve our employees, we ask that you please take a **quick three-question survey** to help determine the number of vaccine doses needed to meet demand at Austal facilities. COVID-19 vaccines are in high demand and we want to ensure we are doing all we can to provide for our workforce and support our community.

Vaccines are the best tool to end the pandemic and relax pandemic rules. To encourage vaccination, employees participating in onsite vaccinations are allowed to vaccinate on the clock.

Alabama is currently vaccinating frontline health care workers and nursing home residents. After Jan. 18, people 75 and older can get a vaccine. Appointments can be scheduled by calling ADPH at 1-855-566-5333. More information on vaccination locations can be found [here](#).

California is currently vaccinating everyone in the state's phase 1A priority group, including dentists and home health care workers. Adults 75 and older are in the next phase of distribution, along with people who work in the education, childcare, emergency services and food and agriculture sectors.

Washington, D.C. and much of Virginia moved into their next phases of vaccinations, targeting older residents and other vulnerable populations. D.C. began vaccinating residents 65 and older, while some jurisdictions in Virginia began making appointments to inoculate residents 75 and older.
